

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

FEATURE CAR



TECH TIPS

WINTER STORAGE TIPS (or tucking your M.G. in for a long sleep)

Editor's Note: This article was given to us from MiniMan the British Car maintenance shop in Carp. It was copied from Moss Motoring (issue unknown) and was written by John Twist of University Motors, Grand Rapids, Michigan.

Due to the poor condition of the photo copy I had to retype the article, so any typos or omissions are mine.

SYSTEM PROTECTION

- 1. ENGINE: Fresh oil is usually adequate for several months of relative dry storage. If the MG is going to be stored longer, or if the humidity is high, then the engine should be started at regular intervals and allowed to warm up (with the garage door open please). If this is not possible, introduce oil into the cylinders. Before replacing the plugs, turn the engine over slowly, this will move oil through the pistons and valves. Covering the tailpipe with duct tape prevents moisture from entering the exhaust system, as tape over the air cleaner inlet keeps moisture from the carb.
- 2.IGNITION: Normally, there are no preventive measures. However, if the MG is going to be stored for several years (hopefully NOT!), the distributor can should be oiled with light oil.
- 3. COOLING: The 50/50 solution of glycol antifreeze and water is all the attention the cooling system receives. Some owners suggest that Armorall or a similar product can extend the life of the radiator hoses.
- 4. FUEL: If the MG is going to be stored for just the winter, then the full tank of gasoline, perhaps with the addition of "drygas" or gas line antifreeze will be satisfactory. If the storage will be longer than a year, then draining the float bowls to prevent the build up of varnish would be wise.
- 5. CLUTCH: Two problems can occur with long term storage, the clutch hydraulics can leak and the clutch disc can rust to the flywheel or pressure plate. Exercising the pedal on a regular basis can prevent this situation from happening. Simply start your car and move it back and forth a couple of times. Remember to change clutch fluid (and brake fluid) on a regular basis. These fluids absorb water over time and have a nasty habit of causing clutch and brake seizures.
- 6. SUSPENSION: Winter storage causes no problems with the

suspension so don't feel compelled to put your car on blocks. As above, simply move your car, even as little as a foot, in order to keep the bearings free.

- 7. BRAKES: Rolling your car back and forth and pumping the brakes will prevent the pads from rusting to the rotor.
- 8. BATTERIES: Remove the battery from the car during winter storage. Keep it charged and in a warm place.
- 9. BODY: To prevent oxidization or scratches, cover with a breathable cover, not a plastic tarp, this will prevent humidity from being trapped between the tarp and the car.
- 10. INTERIOR: Ventilation is important when winter storing, but measures must be taken to prevent rodents from taking up residence. Mothballs or flakes may help.
- 11. Too solve all of the above problems, the easiest thing to do is put the top down and drive to Florida!

Here are some of the high points from Terry Dale's talk that he presented at the last MG club meeting. He began by stating that there are differing points of view on this subject and that if its worked for you for years then don't change it. He covered all the points mentioned in the proceeding article although added other helpful tips and some different opinions.

- #1 climate and humidity controlled environment is preferable BUT often NOT practicle. It is important that the storage area is DRY and constantly cold this will decrease the tendency for moisture/humidity buildup.
- #2 Fill the gas tank TO THE RIM this reduces air space therefore decreases rust formation inside the tank. Helpful to add gas stabilizer this reduces tendency for 'varnish' formation throughout the fuel system. After addition of stabilizer the engine should be run for a short period of time. This allows stabilizer to move through the system.
- #3 Change oil BEFORE putting car away old oil has lots of 'gunk' in it. These dirt particles and acids will cause damage over the long term.

#4 Take the battery OUT of the car and store. The battery should be charged once per month-this prevents 'sulfation' and inactivity of the chemicals. Charging the battery in the off season will greatly extend the life. Battery must be warm when charging. Keep the top of it clean and dry. Do not store on cement. Cement doesn't actually remove the charge from the battery but decreases temperature of the battery. Low temperatures cause decreased chemical reactions therefore weaker battery.

#5 The theory of jacking up a car is to take the load off the suspension. This is a LOT OF WORK! This allows the suspension to hang free - over the long term increasing the life of the suspension. Axel stands should be placed under the frame in the front and at the front pickup point of the rear springs. This also prevents flat spots especially on radial tires.

- if not jacking up the car, inflate tires to maximum pressure.

#6 Take out spark plugs, put in 1 teaspoon of regular engine oil, turn engine over couple times then replace plugs. This prevents rings from sticking.


#7 other points included - don't leave hand break on, keep car closed and covered (plug any holes that will look inviting to rodents!!). The cover MUST be breathable - don't want to hold moisture against the car. Anything that is rubber or vinyl should be treated (Armorall works well) to prevent drying. Keep the convertible top UP - especially if you may want it up at one point in the spring! WD40 can be applied to the rotors to prevent rusting.

#8 Starting the car during storage - this is a controversial area. Terry feels that unless the car is adequately warmed up (doesn't occur by idling in the garage) it should not be started. The reasoning behind this is that when the car is running corrosive compounds are produced by combustion - these acids pass out of the exhaust system only when the car is driven. Running the car in the garage doesn't clear combustion byproducts therefore decreasing the life of the muffler system.




